Project Types

Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) &

Recreational Trails Program (RTP):

Non-motorized transportation facilities, supporting infrastructure and programs

- Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) Program: three categories;
 - 1. Projects that reduce the number of vehicle trips and/or Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT);
 - 2. Projects that reduce emissions related to traffic congestion; and/or
 - 3. Projects that reduce the per mile rate of vehicle emissions through improved vehicle and fuel technologies.

CMAQ funding cannot be used for repaving or reconstructing a roadway, nor can it be used to fund motor vehicle capacity expansion projects.

Call For Projects Considerations and Requirements

- Federal funding, federal requirements
 - Reimbursement NOT Disbursement
 - Local match = 14.56% of total project
 - TAP & RTP: FFY 2023-2025
 - CMAQ: FFY 2023-2024
- Competitive process
- Buy America: All proposed projects that include steel or iron must demonstrate ability to comply with Buy America requirements; waivers will not be considered
- Coordination with RTPO and NMDOT District
- Application screening:
 - ADA Transition Plan or Policy, where required (50 or more employees)
 - Title VI Policy
 - Financial review audit findings could disqualify an applicant

Eligible Entities

- Local governments
- Tribal governments
- Transit agencies
- School districts
- NMDOT (except TAP)
- State or Federal government entities

Note: Nonprofits, and MPOs/RTPOs are NOT eligible project sponsors.

In-Kind Match

In-kind contributions are available as an option for meeting the local match. However, in-kind contributions must be approved by the NMDOT prior to execution of the funding agreement (outlined in T/LPA Handbook Chapter 2 - Agreements) and should be discussed at the feasibility meeting. Examples of in-kind matches include:

- Donations of funds, materials, services,
- Agency force account,
- Right-of-way acquisition, and
- Utility relocation.

The local match may also be fulfilled through a combination of cash and in-kind contributions. All in-kind contributions must be quantified, tracked, and reported throughout the project just as matching funds would be.

Local Lead Project Certification Requirements

All 5 certifications (Environmental, ROW, Utilities, Railroad, ITS) are required when the following conditions are met:

- 1. The Project has Federal Funding in ANY phase.
- 2. The Project required Federal Actions, i.e.; ROW acquisition of Federal Lands, etc.
- 3. The Project is within or crosses NMDOT Right-of-Way.

The projects that are funded with 100% State and Local funds are *also* required to get all 5 Certifications when the following conditions are met:

- 1. The Project required Federal Actions, i.e.; ROW acquisition of Federal Lands, etc.
- 2. The Project is within or crosses NMDOT Right-of-Way.
- 3. They Project is funded with LGRF, MAP, CAP, Capital Outlay and the agreement is executed for State Fiscal Year 2020/2021 or Prior.

Projects that are funded with the state Transportation Project Fund (TPF) funds and DO NOT meet the conditions above will not be required to obtain the 5 certifications. The local entity will be required to consult with NMDOT Environmental section in order to determine the local entities level of effort to comply with Federal/State/and Local laws.

TAP & RTP Scoring Criteria

- 1. Planning (6 points)
- 2. Economic Vitality (3 points)
- 3. Safety and Security (3 points)
- 4. Accessibility and Mobility through Integration and Connectivity (3 points)
- 5. Protection and Enhancement of the Environment
 - A. Promote environmental, energy conservation and reduce green-house gas emissions (3 points)
 - B. Improve quality-of-life for residents (3 points)
 - C. Achieve community's land-use goals (3 points)
- 6. Efficient System Management (3 points)
- 7. System Preservation (3 points)
- 8. Equity (3 points)

Total: maximum of 33 points

Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement (CMAQ)

approximately \$11 million funded yearly

CMAQ Eligible Projects

- Transit improvements
- Traffic Demand Management
- Active transportation network improvements.
- Roundabouts, HOV lanes, left-turn or other managed lanes,
- Bicycle and pedestrian facilities that reduce vehicle trips (not exclusively recreational)
- Road Diets are eligible projects if the project designates part of the road surface to nonmotorized or active transportation and the project application demonstrates
 - the project would result in a mode shift along the corridor and
 - the lane reconfiguration will not negatively impact vehicular level of service on the corridor to an extent that it increases net mobile emissions
- Traffic calming measures
- Carpools or vanpools
- Diesel engine replacement, repowering (plan to address Buy America)

CMAQ Funding Thresholds:

- Infrastructure minimum of \$500,000 total costs
- Non-infrastructure no minimum

CMAQ Scoring Criteria

- 1. Planning (10 points)
- 2. Transportation Demand Management (25 points)
- 3. Air Quality Improvement (20 points)
- 4. Economic Vitality (10 points)
- 5. Safety and Security (20 points)
- 6. Accessibility and Connectivity (10 points)
- 7. Equity (5 points)

Total: maximum of 100 points

Penalties and Deductions

- Poorly written, lacking clarity, and/or the scope is not well defined (penalty up to -10 points)
- Inactive Projects (penalty of -5 points per inactive project)



Attributes of successful applications

- Planning: Project appears in and is consistent with numerous planning documents.
- Narrative: Responses are clear, compelling, and concise. Major claims are supported with data and documentation.
- Consistency: Responses are internally consistent.
- Alignment: Project demonstrates strong alignment with the purpose of the grant.
- Impact: Persuasive case that project will have a high impact and level of use.

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
